D. D. Home and the Mystery of Iniquity

SIR,—It may possibly be remembered by those who read my chapter on D. D. Home in my Some Human Oddities (London, 1947) that I mentioned on page 107 a story about 'the mystery of iniquity', about which Lord Normanby's brother told Mrs Browning. A kindly critic has reminded me that in the American re-issue of Some Human Oddities I let this passage stand without alteration, although after a series of exhaustive inquiries I had managed to nail down this story to its original source.

Since readers of the *Journal* may like to know what is the solution of the mystery it will be sufficient to tell them that it had no relevance whatever to the sexual inclinations of D. D. Home but referred to some misunderstanding about the acquisition of a greatcoat. So my supposition as to what the mystery was has been shown to be without foundation and I gladly take this opportunity

of setting the record straight.
