## Republicans Condemn Capitalism

### Republican National Committee Cries Out for Mercy

Republican National Committee (RNC) consultants waved their hands wildly trying to stop the current crop of Republican candidates from bashing capitalism, the most curious round of talking points ever to emanate from the most thoroughly unpopular array of Republican choices ever to run for president.

of the Republican party."

"They're confused," agreed another political analyst acknowledging that he was out of contexts in which to evaluate phrases like "vulture capitalist" in the mouth of Governor Rick Perry. "And frankly," he added, "so am I."

Texas Gov. Rick Perry (R) dropped out of the race just before the South Carolina primary, but not before describing Republican rival Mitt Romney, former Massachusetts governor, as a "vulture capitalist," arguing that Romney is trying to "paper over" the details of his work at Bain Capital.

"There's a real difference between venture capitalism and vulture capitalism," Perry told Fox News Channel's Sean Hannity one night. "Venture capitalism we like. Vulture capitalism, no. And the fact of the matter is that he's going to have to face up to this at some time or another, and South Carolina is as good a place to draw that line in the sand as any."

Perry cited two companies in Gaffney and Georgetown, S.C., that he said had lost jobs while the venture capital firm took in millions of dollars. He accused Romney and Bain of "picking their bones clean" rather than working to "clean up those companies, save those jobs."

Oakland police officers reprimanded for covering their identification badges with tape argued that they needed to conceal their identity from Occupy protesters as a safety precaution.

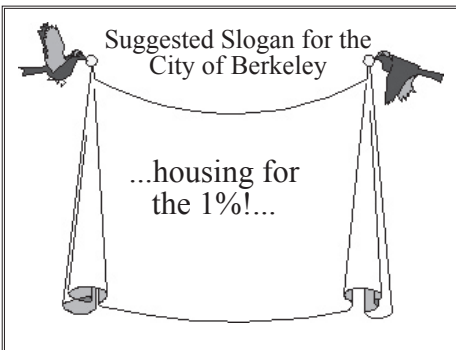

## "Citizens United" Under Attack - Corporations' Feelings Hurt

Misguided citizens and some of their even more misguided elected officials are taking action in cities and states across the country by passing resolutions opposing fair and absolutely legal corporate influence in politics made possible by the two-year-old Supreme Court decision known as "Citizens United."

"This is an important decision to us," stated Philip Morris International CEO Louis Camilleri who received a pay package valued at more than \$20.6 million in fiscal 2010. "It isn't that we couldn't buy campaigns before this, it's just that most people saw it as unfair. Now people know it's perfectly fine."

"That's right," added tobacco industry giant Brown and Williamson's Susan Ivey, whose compensation for 2009 was \$16.2 million from a base salary of \$1.2 million. "We used to have to sneak around and obscure our contributions, but now we can just flat-out buy the representation and legislation we need."

"It really hurts our feelings when we're not considered part of the process," agreed Exxon Mobil Corp. CEO Rex W. Tillerson, whose salary ranked at the top of the category with \$21 million in total direct compensation. "I cried when I read that some people didn't like it."

Local and state-wide resolutions have been introduced in CA, CO, FL, HI, MA, ME, MI, MT, NC, NJ, NM, NY, OK, OR, PA, RI, SD, VT, WA and WI. At the federal level, ten proposed constitutional amendments have been introduced during the 112th Congress, making it clear that

well-funded educational efforts by wealthy media sources like the Pepper Spray Times (PST) are needed to keep Citizens United safe from citizen meddling.

"We may not be getting million dollar contributions from environmentally destructive oil and gas companies yet," stated PST Editor Grace Underpressure. "But we want to make it clear that we're eager to take the money."

Under the so-called "United For the People" banner, more than 60 organizations representing millions of activists around the country are working to harness the grassroots power of the vast majority of Americans who sadly believe there is too much money in politics, when in fact there is not enough.

As the second anniversary of Citizens United passes this month, the expanding network of organizations united in mocking, misguided, and pointless opposition to unchecked corporate spending in our elections is coordinating a series of actions from grassroots gatherings to rallies at courthouses and corporate headquarters across the nation to "let the peoples' voice be heard", as they put it, when in fact what they are doing is trying to muzzle hard-working oil and tobacco industry voices who deserve to be heard.

"Citizens United" was long overdue," stated AT&T Inc. CEO Randall Stephenson who receives \$19.8 million in total direct compensation. "When I contribute to a political campaign all I'm saying is that when rich people sit at the table, people ought to listen."

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# Cool New Occupy-inspired Gadgets Soon to Be Available at Your Police Department

California-based T3 Motion, which specializes in mobility vehicles, recently announced the debut of the latest in crowd control equipment.

"We call it the Advanced Non Lethal Occupy Crowd Control Electric Vehicle (ANLOCCEV)," stated a company spokesperson. "We saw a need during the recent Occupy encounters, and we decided we should fill it."

The prototype, according to the company, is designed "specifically to provide law enforcement with humane and safe alternatives to most techniques used during riots and violent protests."

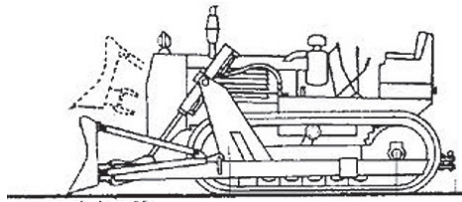
Berkeley Mayor Tom Bates was seen confiscating newspapers throughout town hoping to alter the outcome.

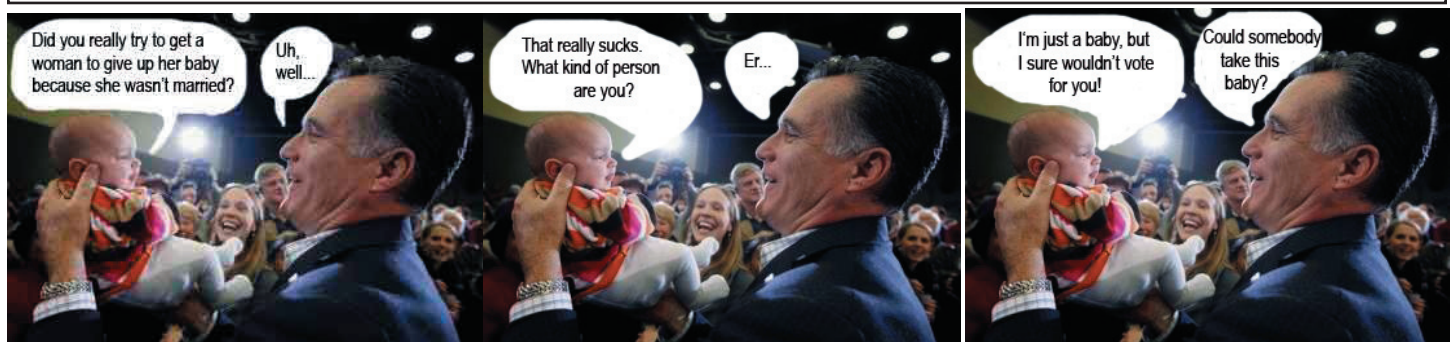

# SUSAN G. KOMEN ORGANIZATION BOOTS SCREENINGS FOR POOR WOMEN, THEN BACKS OFF AFTER HACKERS ATTACK

Planned Parenthood received more than three million dollars in backlash donations after the Susan G. Komen for the Cure breast cancer foundation briefly announced that it would eliminate grants to Planned Parenthood for breast cancer screening.

“Our commitment to fighting breast cancer is still really strong,” stated Karen Handel, who was hired as Komen’s senior vice president of public policy last year and ran for governor of Georgia in 2010 on a strong anti-abortion platform. “Almost as strong as our commitment to ending women’s access to abortion.”

Puzzled inquirers about the institution of the cancer screening cutoff were told that the Komen organization had instituted new guidelines celebrated by conservative religious and anti-abortion groups which forbid grants to organizations under local, state or federal investigation or named Planned Parenthood, since the ongoing investigation at Penn State didn’t seem to count.

The congressional inquiry was launched by Rep. Cliff Stearns (R-Fla.) who insisted that the Komen organization’s decision was theirs alone, and that any political gain he was getting from launching the investigation was purely coincidence.

“I’m the Chairman of the House Energy

and Commerce Committee’s Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations,” he stated. “I can keep Planned Parenthood under investigation forever if I want to.”

Critics objected that the Komen organization’s move could put more women at risk by reducing breast cancer screening nationwide, but Handel initially dismissed the concern, pointing out that the only women the decision might affect were poor women who tried to cross the threshold of a Planned Parenthood clinic and probably shouldn’t be reproducing anyway.

“That part of the population needs reduction,” stated Handel. “Poor people are really dragging down their demographic.”

Founder and CEO Nancy Brinker of the Komen organization found her organization’s website hacked and resorted to You-

tube to respond to the cascade of national and international outrage at the refusal to fund cancer screenings at Planned Parenthood, which is not the only organization funded by Susan G. Komen grants under investigation.

Like Planned Parenthood, Penn State is currently the subject of a federal government investigation. But the Komen group only cancelled the Planned Parenthood grants until hackers’ and public reaction made them realize it was a really, really bad idea and a bonfires of pink hats and Komen for the Cure t-shirts began warming Occupy sites across the nation.

“Pure coincidence,” suggested Brinker regarding the Planned Parenthood issue coming up before Penn State’s grant evaluation. “We alphabetize really badly around here. That Penn State file is here somewhere and we really mean to get to it.”

“We can do this,” stated one of the hackers who worked to keep the Susan G. Komen site shut down. “We can all do this together.”

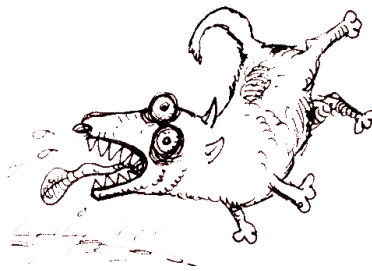
