

PSY 2563-01T (Summer 2021, 10 Wk) Cognitive Psychology (On-line)



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This syllabus may change during the course of the semester. Students will be advised immediately if any changes are made.

Course Objectives: We will examine how humans think and solve problems. Topics to be covered include cognitive neuroscience, perception, attention, memory, imagery, language, concepts and knowledge, problem solving, and reasoning and decision making. The course will be in video lecture format. There will be three online exams.

Prerequisite(s): PSY 1013 Introduction to Psychology, with a grade of "C" or better.

Credit Hours: 3

Online Tools: Course content is maintained on a simple website accessible via https://ratthing.com/u/3 or via UTSA Blackboard. All exams are administered on UTSAs Blackboard system. You may connect to it by going to http://utsa.blackboard.com. Students may also purchase access to Cengage MindTap, but it is not required.

Because this is an online course that you are completing at your own pace, there will be NO MAKEUP EXAMS given. This includes those online exams that are halted while you are taking them.

Grading System

Exams: You will take three exams per 4 chapters of the text book, and one exam covering the last 3 chapters. All exams are multiple choice exams administered on Blackboard. Each of these exams will consist of 65 multiple choice questions. You will be given 90 minutes to complete each exam. If you reach the 90 minute time limit and you are not finished with an exam, Blackboard will end the exam and your exam will be graded. Any questions you did not answer will be counted as wrong.

Grade Weights Grades will be weighted according to the following:

- Exams: Each of the 4 exams will count for twenty percent (25%) of your grade for a total of one-hundred percent (100%) of your grade.
- No extra credit will be given!
